PRACTICALTIP



Adopt-a-Staff

Take a minute and fast-forward your brain to midsummer. You know that week-the one where suddenly staffers are starting to get tired, burned out and distracted. The summer demands on you are great too, making it tough for you to personally provide the encouragement each staff member needs. But by being proactive this spring, you can ensure staff members are covered in prayer, encouragement and accountability when summer heats up. Once you have your summer staff hired, ask others connected to your camp-former staff, church leaders, camp parents, and so on-to adopt a staff member for the summer. Give suggestions for ways people can encourage and challenge that staff member through letters, email, phone calls and care packages throughout the summer season. Setting an adopt-a-staff framework now can provide encouragement to your staff and help alleviate some pressure during the summer months.

Dive in!

It's no secret that water intrigues and relaxes people around the globe. Whether it's splashing in a puddle, riding on a surfboard, diving into the deep end, being sprayed by a waterfall or just listening to the crash of waves or the gurgle of a creek, water draws us in and has the power to refresh and relax. You see it at camp all the time. But why? As Christians we know that water holds spiritual significance, pointing to the Creator and serving as a symbol of the life God gives us through Jesus. And now neuroscientists on the cutting edge of research are pinpointing the particular ways nature, and especially water, impact the human brain. "Focused time in nature activates other parts of our brains, giving our fatigued frontal lobe [associated with executive function, cognitive control and supervisory attention] a break. Areas of our brain associated with emotions, pleasure and empathy can now take over, providing a calming influence that is measurable in brain scans and blood tests alike" (*Blue Mind*, Wallace J. Nichols, 2014, Little, Brown and Co., p. 151). It's a complex interaction of chemicals, sensory stimulation, hormones and so on that all work together to cause water to be renewing and even healing to the human body and mind. A United Kingdom study called "Mappiness" tracked 22,000 people's well-being and found that "the highest increase in happiness in an outdoor environment occurred when people were near water" (*Blue Mind*, p. 63).

Got water? Dive in! Use whatever water you have for the benefit of yourself, your staff and your campers. Not quite waterfront property? That's OK. The research says even simple things like desk fountains and sound machines can have an effect. Look for creative ways to incorporate water into your own day and the life of your camp.

Unexpected Moments

You never know what God is going to do next. For example, when we hosted a church youth retreat last month, I expected to use our new Upward Tower to teach these teens how a relationship with God is an adventure that continually calls us upward into a closer relationship with Him. And that's just what we did.

They spent hours climbing, pulling and scrambling their way up to the top of the 50-foot tower and zip lining to the ground, cementing the lesson in their minds through an unforgettable experience. But I never expected what happened next.

As the exhausted group shuffled off to get cleaned up for supper, one of the students, named Sherri, approached my wife and me to ask if she could have a moment of our time. We soon found that she was about the same age as our son, planning to finish high school in May, and trying to prepare for an unknown future. Sherri was interested in pursuing outdoor-leadership-based ministry but was feeling unsure and desperately desired direction from the Lord.

What I shared with her over the next 20 minutes was nothing heroic, prophetic or particularly insightful. I just shared our story. I told her how God had dramatically interrupted my prayers one night, directing me to a camp where I ended up falling in love with my future wife and with camp ministry. I shared how I'd gone to a college that I couldn't afford, but God had miraculously provided the needed funds. I told her how Jen and I got married when it didn't make any sense, and God had blessed us with a beautiful family. And I told her that where I am now is nothing close to what I envisioned for my life when I was her age, but that I wouldn't trade it for anything because God's plans are always better than our own.

As I packed away the last few pieces of climbing gear, I looked at her and saw tears brimming in her eyes. "I can't tell you how much this conversation has meant to me," she said. "This was exactly what I needed to hear. You just confirmed everything I know God has been trying to say to me. Thank you." She then headed off to join her group with a peace in her heart and a quiet determination in her soul.

I never know when teachable moments are going to arise, but I do know this: we find a lot of them at camp. Whether they are planned events like the Upward Tower, or unexpected conversations with young people like Sherri, these experiences can change and shape lives for the sake of God's Kingdom. I can't wait to see what He does next.
