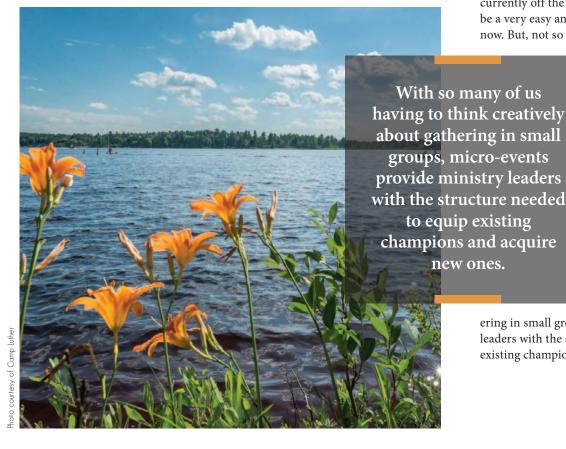
But, let's all say it together ... COVID.

ering in small groups, MEs provide ministry leaders with the structure needed to equip existing champions and acquire new ones.

Making micro-events part of your 2021 strategy

As the name implies, MEs are small, with typically less than 30 people, and follow the N.I.C.E. structure:

- **Narrow-focused:** About one expression of your cause
- **Integrated:** In connection with your overall growth and acquisition strategies
- Call to action: Invites guests to take their first step in the cause
- **Experiential:** Step into the shoes of the people you serve

This could look like a camp champion inviting friends to join them at their backyard fire with s'mores and worship. The host shares their story of connection to camp and specifically focuses on the power that camp has on campers and staffers alike. The host would then conclude the evening with an invitation to sponsor a camper or as a group help build the new chapel at camp.

Don't give up on inviting new champions to your cause. Think differently. Get creative. Rally your champions and get a few microevents on the calendar this spring. Need ideas? I am just an email or call away, and am eager to brainstorm options with you.



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
